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Free Report Detailed Page: "7 Steps to Designing Fitting and Furnishing your Workspace"








When a supplier knows exactly what you need, and the constraints you are working with, it makes it a lot easier to recommend specific products, ways to design and layout your space, and how to get the best value for your investment. This is often only possible if we can come to site to properly understand what you need, with the location and space you have to work with.

Avoid any suppliers that are hesitant to do in person visits, as it tends to show they would prefer to sell you products without first making sure they are properly applicable. At the very least, ensure they can offer you a floorplan scale drawing of your project before you proceed with an order.





The right floorplan helps both save and maximise your space, and if it is detailed, it also takes away any unknowns in a project before you commit to ordering. Being able to look at 2D and 3D renders gives you an accurate visualization of your project, helping you pick up on areas that maybe don't work so well, and being able to see opportunities also to increase space, free up space, or simply make workflow better.

Added to this is the benefit of seeing the design and styling of products in your space before making a decision on them. You wouldn't build a house without carefully ensuring plans matched your needs – make sure you get a floorplan design of your workspace to ensure it does the same.






Office furniture and even warehouse storage systems are commonly supplied flat packed to save on freight and delivery. Ensure when you are purchasing your furniture you are aware of whether the product comes assembled or not, and make sure you allow for it if not.

Additional to this, if the same company that is supplying the furniture is also delivering and installing, it takes away any potential issues that might arise from having the incorrect item supplied/ damaged or insufficient parts or simply the installers not understanding the layout and design brief. If the supplier you use has in-house installers it makes the delivery process much smoother, and means it is one less thing you need to worry about in your project.





Often during a build process, moving premises or upgrading an existing space, the last thing that gets thought of is furnishing the space properly. It is correct that generally furniture and shelving is the last piece of the workspace puzzle, but we feel it should be something that you look at seriously in conjunction with the other moving parts. Often we hear from customers who are about to move into a new space and need to have it furnished inside 2-3 weeks. We can generally help to some extent, but if the process is started 4-6 weeks earlier it can mean there is many more options available, which can offer a more tailored solution.

Be sure to advise your supplier of a completion or 'move in' date for your project so that they are sure to offer solutions that work with this timeline.





Getting everything set up and working in a new office can be challenging at the best of times, let alone if anything goes wrong with any product. A large number of office furniture or storage system companies offer furniture but go missing as soon as anything goes wrong with a product, and if onsite support is needed it can take weeks or even months to arrive.


